Here is a quote by Eve Arnold that caught my attention recently.

"The ordinary does not exist".

I often go back through my library of past photos, sorted by dates, and then return to those locations and try my best to photograph them in the same way as previously done. However it is usually to find that the lighting is quite different to when I first shot the subject.

You will find the same thing Eve Arnold found and realized, that the world's landscapes are constantly changing.

Secondly, I and some of my friends, who also enjoy photography, will take photos together while on an outing. Then we all take a look at each others photos to see how each of us is progressing and improving with our photography.

This helps create new ideas for me by seeing what others are able to do and what subjects they like to photograph. Sometimes a shot that I might think looks really good, doesn't to the others. Your photographing buddies might see something which is a distraction in your photo and you then realise that by taking the same photo at a different angle or perspective your composition can be greatly improved and without having to resort to Photoshop to fix your photo at a later time.

So when you see the opportunity to spend time taking photographs with other club members, do take full advantage of those opportunities. Not only will your photography get better but you may also find another buddy to photograph with on a regular occasion.



We've gotten a very good response to the proposed photography program at Youth Guidance. To date we have 20 students who have signed up to participate in the first session, which is scheduled for the start on May 14 to June 18. They are targeting meeting on Wednesdays between 5:30 and ending a little after 7PM. if successful the program will repeat in the fall.



Again this course is for disadvantaged kids ranging in age from 10 to 14. The size of the class will be determined by the agenda and how many cameras we have available. Some of our members have been generous in providing used "point & shoots" and printing paper. But we still need more cameras, so if you got one that is not being used, bring it to the next meeting.

A well Organized celebration!



t is almost the longest day of the year, a time associated with mid-summer, sunshine and warm weather. This year spring has hardly sprung yet. Although there has been many sunny days the wind has been steadily blowing from the north with a chill that almost necessitates wearing gloves during the day!

From that you will gather that jaunts out to the countryside to photograph are not something at the



top of the "to do" list. Usually at this time of the year one would be spending time trying to photograph nesting birds, and other new borne wild life. A adventure that is well out of the question for a Florida blooded shooter this year. Yes, there is still plenty to see and capture, but trying to get close-up and focus-close has been very difficult. Due to the weather, wild life food is in very short supply and all the creatures are very skittish and do not settle for very long in one spot for a portrait.



However, two very spectacular photo opportunities occur this month each year. They are the Queen's speech and the official birthday of the Queen. On those two days Royalty parades by coach from Buckingham Palace to the White Hall area where the parliamentary offices and government buildings are located. The spectacle of the liveried guards both marching and on horse back as they escort the guilded horse drawn carriages is a sight that every one should see at least once during their lifetime. It is worth the trip across the pond to enjoy the ceremonial perfection and be amongst hundreds of thousands of spectators

lining the routes. It is a world citizens' melting pot on those two days when the English language is hard to



determine and the excitement of the people clamouring to savour the atmosphere sweeps one, literally, off ones feet. Although it is a very British experience for those attending, it is also a very global affair when politics and strife seems to be so distant that people of all ages and origins are united in their enjoyment of the moment. Politely jostling to get the best views while adopting the best of British manners and cheering loudly.

While all this is going on, just four miles from the centre of London there is a wetlands park covering some forty acres or more. It is a wonderful location

to visit and where one can photograph a wide variety of wild life. This year the BBC has stationed dozens of under cover TV cameras around the property and enabled those not anxious to brave the cooler elements, to be able to watch birds hatching their eggs and animals giving birth to their young, from the comfort of the living room.



Each evening the BBC provides a full presentation of the day's wild life activities that took place in the preserve. Not quite the same as being out in the fields and hedgerows with a camera at hand, but satisfying in many ways. It helps prepare the groundwork for next year's spring photography jaunts. Spring is sure to be completely different next year. That's Britain!



Even though the weather has not been kind to us humans, the plants and trees have gone through their springtime changes, a little late admittedly. The transformation from a dull and dreary landscape to a picturesque and vibrantly green one has been completed. A walk along a country lane and the hedge rows can be seen to be full of flowers and insects. The air is a buzz with bees and birds singing heartily, and there is a pleasant feeling of tranquility that makes one very aware of that there is plenty to photograph



if one just looks closely at the surroundings.




Although is has been very cloudy on most days, the ultra violet light is extremely intense providing some startling lighting contrasts. This makes it an interesting exercise in finding the right settings and adjustments to make to the camera. It is so strange to find that the camera settings made for Florida shooting, although the brightness here seems similar at times to that of Florida, just do not work here, at all.

This was brought to my attention when a friend remarked how black my glasses appeared to be when I wear them out in the sunlight. It

seems that the ultra violet light here is much more intense and my glasses get very much darker than they do in Florida. The camera exposure settings therefore have to be tweaked constantly.

Last month I mentioned that the local photo club was busy participating in a district wide contest. They had great hopes of success, but that was not to be. They had some superb
